CONVENOR'S REPORT

Tēnā Koutou Wāhine Mā o Te Whare Āwhina Mo Nga Wāhine Puawai – Nelson Women's Centre

Here we are at the end of 2021 – 25 years since Women in Nelson Incorporated took ownership of the Women's Centre. The first Women's Centre in Aotearoa to own its own home!!

It is with pleasure we present the 1 July 2020 to 30 June 2021 Annual Convenors' Report.

The year has flown by and through it there have been many challenges for all as the pandemic continues to dominate the world. Despite that the Nelson Women's Centre has managed a number of changes, kept the door open as much as possible, provided essential support to many women and their whānau and a restful place for women to relax and meet others.

It has meant we have not been able to run the usual number of varied, popular workshops but we are grateful to the facilitators who have provided those that could be fitted in between lock down and Covid-19/Delta level changes. The revamped op shop has continued to be well utilised and provided a steady income for the Centre, thanks to the wonderful volunteers who have kept it an inviting room to visit. Unfortunately, a number of fundraising plans were not realised due to Covid-19/Delta restrictions. However, Community Action Nelson ran a movie night twice, and raising over \$1000 for the Centre! A great effort and we intend continuing to run movies as a fun and easy way to get together and raise funds.

Our Coordinator Georgie Kerby, after 2 ½ years of putting her heart and soul into the Centre, left in May 2021 to work for a new entity. Our thanks to Georgie and we wish her well. Anna Mae Angeles joined us in the new, permanent Manager's position in June. Thank you Anna Mae for stepping in so quickly. Your management skills, warmth, empathy and experiences are exactly what the Centre needs to build on the foundations of 25 years, increasing the options and experiences for all women.

Thank you too to our Social Workers, Lyn Ginty and Joanne Thomson, who have provided continued professional support to women and their whanau despite the difficult, changing conditions. It is not always recognised how complex these interventions can be and that they can reduce the need for referrals to statutory agencies. Housing vulnerability continues to be a major problem women bring to the Social Workers. We farewelled Lyn this year too, after 15 years of dedication to the Centre and the women of Nelson. Being an 'open door' for all women means that each day, surprises happen and many situations need instant attention.

We also appreciate the volunteers who assist the staff. You bring a warmth and commitment that adds so much value to what the Centre offers everyone. We are lucky to have the Counsellors who provide an affordable essential service.

GOVERNANCE MEMBERSHIP

We started the financial year with Diane Young, Andrea Kepes, Lisa De Vries, Kate Morrison, Penny Molnar and we are so grateful for Katie O'Donnell, Laura Tinnelly, Letitia Meadows and Ripeka Hoerara for joining us. During the year Diane, Ripeka, Andrea and Lisa stood down. Ripeka, now a mother, is available to us for tikanga advice which we are really pleased to have. We thank Diane for her work for the Centre through the difficult lockdown period and reduction in governance membership, at a time when she was caring for others too. There is much to manage to be a viable charitable organisation so we are fortunate to have diverse skills amongst the governance team and it has been useful to enlist the help of Policy People services for updating policies and Covid19 safety measures.

Laura Tinnelly will be going on maternity leave from the end of this year and we wish her and her whānau all the best for the exciting times ahead with the new pēpē, and thank her for her high energy and input into Governance decisions this year!

Finally, we would like to deeply thank all of the members who have contributed in so many ways throughput the year, our patron, Annette Milligan, for her ongoing support, Tribe and the Soroptimists and all of the individual women who have supported the Centre in so many ways throughout the year.
